DEAR MEMBERS

The recent 'Royal Highland Show Illuminated' project that we have taken to our 8 regions - reconnecting with you, our members, while at the same time bringing the Show back to the fore has been a real highlight.

but for the collective courage and commitment shown by the Board of Directors and staff to plot a way through some pretty dark corridors and, with the support of the membership, to find that light at the end of the tunnel, emerging intact having weathered the storm.

The strength of the Society sits with all of us, members, directors and staff, and we have all played our part in the recovery thus far. As a result, we can look forward with confidence to the future. I feel humbled and privileged to have been able to lead RHASS through this momentous period of its history.

Speaking of privilege, the Chief Executive and I were invited to represent the Society at the memorial service for The Prince Philip, Duke of Edinburgh at Westminster Abbey in March. We were honoured and delighted to be able to do that on all of our behalf – a very special, albeit sombre, occasion.

Finally - and I make no excuse for this – back to the RHS 200. The absolute highlight of this year's Show will be the chance to show off our new pavilion to our members and guests. It is a wonderful building and fitting to be at the heart of our showground at Ingliston. Let's meet there, celebrate and be proud to be part of this wonderful organisation.

AWARDS & GRANTS

APPLY NOW FOR INTERNATIONAL STUDY TOUR FUNDING

As part of its commitment to supporting Scottish agriculture and our rural communities, the RHASS Board has unveiled a new award to enable RHASS members to apply for funding to finance a structured study trip to a Royal Agricultural Society (or equivalent) annual show event, to develop relationships and bring back ideas and observations which can make a tangible difference to RHASS and/or Scottish Agriculture.

This idea arose from a self-funded trip by Matthew Currie, RHASS Director, to the Royal Perth Show in Western Australia in 2018, from which he brought back a number of ideas which RHASS implemented. Reflecting its charitable remit, RHASS believes that such opportunities should not be restricted to those who are in the fortunate position of being able to afford such a trip.

WOMEN IN FOOD & Agriculture summit

RHASS has awarded funding for six candidates to attend the Women in Food & Agriculture Summit – Alix Ritchie, Judith Taylor, Chloe Stewart, Heather Wildman, Lesley Mitchell and Carole Brunton have been announced as the candidates who have earned their place on the trip.

Taking place in Frankfurt, Germany from 14-15 June 2022, the funding will provide the opportunity for the chosen candidates to network and learn from other women working across the worldwide food and agricultural sector.

EVENTS & SPONSORSHIP

SCOTTISH SHOWS FORUM

The 2022 Scottish Shows Forum took place this February, bringing together over 80 delegates representing 40 Scottish agricultural shows from across the country.

Established in 2016, the Forum provides a free platform for Scottish agricultural show organisers to come together, share best practice and learn from one another. RHASS facilitates the Forum to enable knowledge transfer among local show teams and support their common goal of educating the public about the origins of their food.

SCOTLAND FOOD & DRINK Excellence Awards

RHASS is delighted to once again be sponsoring the Scotland Food & Drink Excellence Awards, taking place 8th September 2022.

The event will celebrate the companies, teams, individuals, and employers who are raising the bar and helping to build Scotland's reputation as a land of food and drink.





LANTRA SCOTLAND ALBAS

RHASS is proud to be associated with the Lantra Scotland Awards for Land-based and Aquaculture Skills (ALBAS), which support young people living, learning, and working in rural Scotland.

RHASS supports two ALBAS categories – one being through CARAS (Council for Awards of Agricultural Societies) award, which was established by the UK's four agricultural societies. This year's winner was Alicja Blaszczyk, aged 24 from Ormiston in East Lothian, who has been undertaking a Modern Apprenticeship in General Agriculture at George Brown & Sons through Borders College. She was also awarded the Modern Apprentice of the Year and Agriculture Learner of the Year prizes.

The other is the Secondary Schools Award, given in recognition of schools with exceptional standards in rural skills training. This year the award had joint winners - Wallace Hall Academy in Dumfries and Galloway and The Nicolson Institute in Stornoway.

LONG SERVICE

RHASS is very proud to continue to celebrate those who have received a long service award by providing two free tickets to the Royal Highland Show. This is a change from previous years when up to four tickets could be requested and reflects the restrictions on capacities and changing demographics.



THE ROYAL HIGHLAND SHOW ILLUMINATED

Earlier this year, the Royal Highland Show marked its 200th anniversary with a series of immersive storytelling installations, projecting its rich history onto historic landmarks and buildings across Scotland. Taking place across March and April, the events, produced in association with Turcan Connell, projected expressive imagery, woven together with never-before-seen treasures and untold stories from the Show archives, creating a magical experience which truly brought the Show's illustrious history to life.

The immersive events aimed to raise awareness of the Show and highlight its positive impact on Scotland throughout the years.



THE EVENTS WERE POPULAR ON SOCIAL MEDIA

The installations featured a 5-minute-long visual history of the Show, told through animations, images, films and archive footage. They took place in eight locations around Scotland, from Dumfries & Galloway to Inverness, referencing how the Show would tour each of the RHASS regions annually before it settled permanently at Ingliston in 1960.

The Royal Highland Show is a key moment in both Scotland's events and agricultural calendars - these installations showcased its wide-ranging impact and influence over the last two centuries while looking to the future of both the Show and the Society.

RHASS Chairman Bill Gray commented:

To celebrate the bicentenary of the Show, we wanted to do something special. The Royal Highland Show Illuminated is the perfect way to give back to regional communities and the RHASS membership across Scotland and herald the return of the Show.

"After two long years without a full Show, we are going all out to make the 200th anniversary Royal Highland Show the best one yet. The events were a powerful and poignant portrayal of the Show's value and importance to Scotland's communities.

A personal development programme for women in agriculture



The Scottish Government-funded, but independently delivered, 'Be Your Best Self' programme supports women living or working in agriculture in Scotland.

It forms an integral part of the Scottish Government's vision to make Scottish agriculture a fairer, more inclusive industry, where farm succession is not determined by gender. Training is accessible to all women with the hope that more will take on senior roles in agricultural organisations helping to make Scottish agriculture a more resilient and economically sustainable industry.

The specific aims and objectives of the Be Your Best Self programme are to support the participants to build their confidence and enhance their networking skills. The programme is delivered by experts from within organisational development, career coaching, mental fitness, psychotherapy, and rural marketing. Content includes building resilience, sustaining or enhancing mental fitness, identifying your strengths and understanding how to play to them, as well as working with others and building a wide and relevant network.


Approximately 60 women have already participated in the programme and have benefited from improvements in their confidence, gained a deeper understanding of their own skills and seen first-hand the value of meeting and engaging with other like-minded women.

Throughout our long history, RHASS has been committed to rewarding excellence and innovation by granting awards that reflect the sentiments contained in our Royal Charter - improvement, encouragement, benefit, communication, preservation and advancement.

The Bicentennial Fund is a new fund set up by RHASS to commemorate 200 years of the Royal Highland Show.

Through the Show, RHASS has been the backbone of the rural community in Scotland for generations. For 4 days of the year, the Show helps us all combat the difficulties of rural living by offering community, support and friendship.

Right now rural Scotland faces challenges unlike any that we have seen before. Living and working in rural areas has never been easy, and today's political and environmental changes, alongside the Covid – 19 pandemic, political and military unrest across the globe and spiralling costs, are causing even more complexities. Our communities and the wider sector need our support to live and work on the land that we have all loved for generations.

The establishment of the RHASS Bicentennial Fund has been created with the purpose of helping those who live, work and breath rural life overcome these challenges.

CELEBRATING 200 YEARS OF

IMPORTANT INFORMATION FOR MEMBERS

Firstly, I want to say a huge thank you to you, the members of the Society, who have responded in your thousands to our call to provide us with an email address as part of your membership record. This is part of our ongoing modernisation of our back-office systems as reported through the last two Annual Reports.

Being able to communicate regularly and in a more tailored way with our members is vital, as well as enabling us to save significantly on post and printing costs. As a charity, it is important that we make best use of all of our resources and assets.

The focus of this edition of Society magazine is, of course, the upcoming bicentennial Show and we have been communicating with you all regularly (some may say too regularly!) over the last few months to ensure that everyone knows what they need to do ahead of the Show, particularly with regards to letting us know on which days you plan to come.

Coming to the Show

Members, of course, have priority to attend the Show and, whilst many of our members know which days they will be attending well in advance, for those who need to retain flexibility then you should book all four days. If you subsequently find you are not coming on one or more days then please contact us at membership@rhass.org. uk to let us know. Members will have priority to attend the Show, however if members are unable to come on a given day or days, then it would be of benefit to the Society to sell an additional ticket to a member

of the public and thereby raise further charitable funds to support others.

All members for whom we have a valid email address will receive a link to an online form to reserve their days at the Show, Junior members' guest badges and children's tickets. Car parking can be bought via Ticketmaster. Members are able to purchase a maximum of four discounted Show entrance tickets for Friends & Family at £25 per ticket and one Adult Member Guest badge per day at £15. Please look out for an email from us in May to buy these. If we do not already have a unique email address linked to your membership, please email us at membership@ rhass.org.uk quoting your full name and membership number as soon as possible to ensure you don't miss out.

Booking in advance

We have had some queries from members about why we are asking people to book in advance for car parking and public tickets. This is common for most events, particularly post-pandemic and, provided the Show is not sold out on a given day, advance tickets will be able to be purchased online (e.g. on a smart phone) just outside the gates or on the way to the event. We are advising people to purchase now to avoid disappointment in the event that one or more days sell out.

We have also had some queries about capacity at the Show. We have set capacities for each day for both the Show and car parking. This is a necessity for public safety and everyone's safe enjoyment of the event. If the Show is a sell-out on all four days then we would still be able to host more people than at the record-breaking 2019 Show. Car parking is, of course, always limited by the space available and this year is no different. The only change is the requirement to book in advance. We gave all members early notice of this as it is available on a first-come, firstserved basis.

The Members' Area

The new Pavilion at Ingliston is at the heart of our expanded Members' Area for the Show. Once you have reserved your days at the Show, your members' badge will be sent out to you. Also in your pack will be a map of the Members' Area so you can plan your visit. Keep an eye on our website and socials for updates on delivery times.

What's new in the competition rings

THE SIGHTS AND SOUNDS OF THE BUSTLING SHOW RINGS WILL BE A WELCOME EXPERIENCE FOR COMPETITORS AND VISITORS THIS YEAR - WITH MANY HAVING NOT EXPERIENCED THEM FOR THREE YEARS.

The magnificent Fletcher McDiarmid Trophy, an incredibly ornate and historic award, will also return this year to be presented to the Overall Beef Champion.

Tying in with the Highland & Islands Presidential Team initiative, there will be a Bothy placed in the centre of the hall. This will house a café hosted by the team at Mimi's Bakehouse, serving delicious cakes and coffees.

This new area has been designed to completely enhance the food and drink experience at the Show, with congestion eased and more opportunities to stop and savour the variety of tastes on offer.

The winners of the Scottish Championships for Dairy, Bread and Honey products will also be announced and celebrated at the Show. Expect to see lovely loaves, beautiful butter, and heavenly honey on display, with well-known names and artisanal producers alike competing for the most prestigious produce awards in Scotland.

Entertainment like never before

As if the Royal Highland Show wasn't enough to entertain - The Big Top is coming to Ingliston and visitors this year will have the chance to extend their stay to attend a concert on the Saturday evening.

Known for their anthemic alt-rock, Scotland's very own Biffy Clyro will bring their prog-rock-influenced sounds to The Big Top on 25th June 2022. The Ayrshire trio's latest album has received rave reviews and this, along with their iconic hits, will certainly call for a night not to be missed!

The concert will take place outwith the main showground on the west side, well away from all areas where livestock and horses are stabled penned or stalled.

The Royal Highland Show site will be fully secured and fenced, with dedicated security in place. Animal welfare remains RHASS' top priority and staff and directors, who understand the needs of Show livestock and their handlers, have been fully engaged in the process.

Of course, there will also be the usual entertainment offerings across the Royal Highland Show itself – expect everything from pipe bands and ceilidhs to choirs and pop music!


Getting there

FLOCK TO THE SHOW

TO CELEBRATE THE RETURN OF GOLDEN SHEARS TO THE ROYAL HIGHLAND SHOW IN 2023, RHASS IS DEVELOPING A LARGE-SCALE PUBLIC ART EVENT ACROSS THE COUNTRY, TITLED 'FLOCK TO THE SHOW'.

The event will feature more than 35 specially designed sheep sculptures that will form a free trail of discovery for local people and visitors of all ages to explore, enjoy and learn about Scotland's long history of sheep production.

Each sculpture will be sponsored by local businesses, community groups and education organisations.

They will also be decorated by local artists and communities – all designed to celebrate the return of the Golden Shears, the international sheep shearing championships. The sculptures will be displayed in locations across the UK, creating a trail highlighting hidden gems and engaging with communities from Selkirk to Kirkwall, Harris to St Andrews. Our flock shall return to the Royal Highland Centre during the Golden Shears, which will be the only time the public will see the entire flock together in one place.

Following Golden Shears our flock will be auctioned at a special event to raise funds that will support the Royal Highland & Agricultural Society of Scotland and the work we and our partners deliver across the country.

Our flock will then scatter and find new homes across the world, ensuring a fitting legacy for the Golden Shears.

Join us at #RHS200 and see the first set come to life in the showground, where our first artists will decorate the sculptures live.

THE FINALE OF RHET YEAR OF BEEF

Since August 2021, RHET has focused on sustainable Scottish Beef Farming, creating many new resources and activities for schools.

In October, we held a virtual farm visit week that saw 57,000 pupils from all over Scotland visiting 63 farms online. More recently, we had our live *Talk to a Farmer* week, where 20,000 school pupils took the opportunity to question 27 Scottish farmers about how they produce our food.

It was a very different experience for our volunteer farmers to engage with pupils online. Still, they all rose to the challenge and overcame the inevitable IT issues. All our new resources are free for schools and are available on our website now – scan the QR to be taken right to them!

Last year, RHET celebrated all things related to the beef industry with its Year of Beef.

For the 2022-2023 academic year, we will be mixing things up with a new focus on all things related to seeds and grains.

The Journey of Food: Seeds & Grains will be launching materials for all levels about wheat,

barley, oats, oilseed rape, and combinable crops such as linseed, beans, and rye.

For schools, these will range from downloadable worksheets for the official Maths Week launch, farmhouse breakfast and Christmas activities, soils & sustainability, the history of cereals, and much more!



RHET AT THE ROYAL HIGHLAND SHOW 2022

To help celebrate the 200th show this year, RHET is producing the 'Great Big A-Z of Food and Farming' story.

We will launch a page a day throughout June, with the whole digital book being released on the 26th of June. This story will cover a wide range of topics in a user-friendly way and be linked to various activities to get involved with.

RHET will also be offering digital engagement via its *Showtime Discovery Trail*. The trail will take young visitors around several points on the showground to learn more about food and farming.

The RHET Discovery Centre at the Royal Highland Show will host the *Grand Finale for Year of Beef*. We will be creating several interactive experiences for families and school pupils around beef farming.

These experiences will include learning the importance of using a weigh crush, auctioning some pupils through the ring, and allowing everyone to create their own rosette or badge. We will also demonstrate the importance of grass, the nutritional value of beef, and condition scoring cows.

In addition, we have launched two competitions in the run-up to the Royal Highland Show.

Our acrostic poem competition invites pupils to compose a short poem using the title *Scottish Farmer*. The Scottish Farmer has sponsored this, and winning entries will be published in their magazine in the weeks before the show.

Pupils have also been invited to design their own rosette, which will be professionally made and presented to the champion of the Beef Cattle class at the Show. This competition has been sponsored by Johnston Carmichael and Murray of Redden.

The winners of both competitions will have the opportunity to take their class on a fully-funded RHET farm visit.

ROYAL HIGHLAND CENTRE EMERGES STRONGER POST-COVID

A host of music events means the venue is back with a bang!

The three-year £15 million investment programme into the Royal Highland Centre was a prudent decision by RHASS directors. During the pandemic, when most event venues battened down the hatches and went into forced hibernation, the 120-acre Royal Highland Centre pivoted from hosting live events to facilitating a giant pop-up Royal Mail sorting office and one of the largest vaccination centres in Scotland, amongst other uses.

Now with live events returning after a two-year hiatus, the Royal Highland Centre is gearing up to host many large-scale events in the coming months, including an exciting series of The Big Top concerts, and of course, the jewel in its crown, the Royal Highland Show.

The Big Top at the Royal Highland Centre will play host to some amazing names in

music in June 2022. Music fans can expect to spend a night under the canvas of The Big Top to get that legendary music festival feel.

Meanwhile, in August the Royal Highland Centre will be home to Connect Music Festival. This major event has an exciting main stage line up as well as DJs and acts set across a further three stages. In addition to this, there will be a wellness area, speakeasy, boutique camping, chefs, VIP experiences and fantastic food & drink.

The importance of the Royal Highland Centre in generating revenue to fund RHASS' charitable activities is significant, which is why the RHASS team will continue to work hard to position the venue as the best choice for large scale events in Scotland.
