Judging of over 3000 cattle, goats, sheep and horses took place at the competitor-only event, which was designed by the RHASS team to bridge the gap between a no-Royal Highland show year in 2020 and the 180th Show, which will take place 23-26 June 2022.

In partnership with Royal Bank of Scotland, with funding of up to £750,000 from the Scottish Government, the event was livestreamed throughout the seven days with 252 of hours of live content and a further thirty hours of ondemand programming produced, all watched over by 270,000 people from across 97 countries including Norway, Finland, Australia, New Zealand, America, Argentina, the Philippines and beyond.

With over two million engagements on social media, the innovative concept was formulated. funded and delivered in less than 12 weeks.

## Sir William Young **Award Winner 2021**

### Alasdair Houston MBE, DL, FRAgS



The late Alasdair Houston MBE, DL, FRAgS, of Gretna House Farms in Gretna Green was awarded this year's prestigious Royal Highland and Agricultural Society of Scotland (RHASS) Sir William Young Award for his exceptional contribution to the world of cattle breeding and service to Scottish agriculture.

The award was presented to Alasdair at his farm by RHASS Chairman Bill Gray shortly before his sad passing earlier this summer.

Alasdair's Gretnahouse herd is one of the most influential in the national Charolais herdbook with bulls to 25,000gns twice at national sales. Added to this outstanding achievement was the creation of an Aberdeen Angus herd in 2011, and in just a decade Gretnahouse Blacksmith is now one of the most sought-after bulls in the breed.

In the early stages of the Simmental breed, the Gretnahouse name echoed through sales rings, with Gretnahouse Supersonic gaining widespread distinction, and even today his name is scattered throughout the herd book.

But 20 years ago, foot and mouth disease ripped the heart out of the prefix, taking with it all the fine animals belonging to the herd. However, with unmatched resolution and conviction of breeding policies, the Gretnahouse name was re-established through a new Charolais breeding programme by embryo transfer and purchasing some of the best genetics from fellow breeders.

A well-respected businessman of wide learning and integrity who was celebrated in the hospitality and tourism sector, Alasdair's true passion was in pedigree livestock breeding. As Chairman of the British Charolais Cattle Society, Alasdair modernised its constitution and mission, driving forward their youth programme which will ensure the Charolais Society thrives in years to come.

Bill Gray paid tribute to Alasdair:

"Anyone in the livestock breeding world who hears 'Gretnahouse' instantly recognises it as a mark of quality, integrity and the passionate production of topquality animals.

"Alasdair has been the driving force behind his fantastic herds, not to mention his contribution to the tourism and hospitality sectors. I had the privilege of presenting the Sir William Young award to Alasdair and he was genuinely humbled to receive the accolade.

"Our thoughts are very much with his wife Lucy and their children Tara and Rafe."

Alasdair will be remembered amongst a number of leading livestock breeders whose successes have previously been acknowledged by the presentation of the Sir William Young award.

#### Ewan Macdonald - PRESIDENT

Ewan farms, along with his brother, on the Black Isle and Wester Ross. They have a mixed farm, with beef, sheep and cereals. Alongside this, they have renewable projects, including a Hydro Scheme and holiday lets, and have also been involved in property development in the local area.

Ewan Macdonald was Vice President of the RHASS Highland region, ten years on the Board of the Highland Hospice and is currently Vice Chairman of, and for the last twenty years actively involved with, Dingwall Auction Mart.

The family farming business was started in the 1920's by his grandfather, Angus Macdonald and has evolved over the years to the business it is today.

His late father, Angus S Macdonald, CBE, was very involved as a Director, Vice President and President in RHASS.

#### Rod MacKenzie - VICE PRESIDENT

Rod Mackenzie, a crofter born and bred, is a wellknown figure in the north of Scotland farming and crofting communities. His working life started as a livestock auctioneer in Dingwall and then followed a successful career working in auction marts throughout the Highlands and Islands and Aberdeenshire. He was secretary and organiser of Black Isle Show for 14 years from 2005 - 2019, and Convener and Commissioner of the Crofting Commission from 2017 until recently.

#### Isobel McCallum - VICE PRESIDENT

Isobel is well known to RHASS, having served as a Director for the Highland region in 2015. She runs a mixed arable and stock farm on the Black Isle, including a pedigree North Country Cheviot flock. Closely involved with the Highlands' agricultural community for over 40 years, Isobel served as the Black Isle Farmers Society's first woman president in 2009. A former Convener of Highland Council and local councillor for many years, Isobel is well acquainted with public life as a long-standing representative for the Highlands.

#### Andrew Shepherd - VICE PRESIDENT

Andrew farms in Moray, running a herd of pedigree Aberdeen Angus. He is better known as a Chartered Accountant with a number of Board roles, including with the quality meat processor Scotbeef Ltd and from September 2021 Chairman of leading property consultants Galbraith.

#### Sandy Cumming CBE - VICE PRESIDENT

Sandy grew up on an upland farm in Strathconon, Ross and Cromarty. He studied Agricultural Economics at Edinburgh University, before spending over 35 years in economic and community development, working for Highlands and Islands Enterprise where he was Chief Executive for a decade. He is a former member of the Accounts Commission, former Board Member and Chair of the Cromarty Firth Port Authority, former Trustee of the Robertson Trust. He is currently Chair of Scotland's Rural College, having served on the SAC/SRUC Board since 2011.

### **RHASS ANNOUNCE 2021 TECHNICAL INNOVATION AWARD WINNERS**

The Royal Highland and Agricultural Society of Scotland (RHASS) has announced the 2021 winners of the Technical Innovation Awards, with one Gold, six Silver and five Certificates of Commendations being awarded.

The awards, RHASS's most longstanding industry accolade, showcase and reward innovation and development within the agricultural sector and are a highly respected award for manufacturers, distributers, providers and inventors.

This year, applicants were once again invited to enter online with judging taking place virtually. Winners were featured as part of the Royal Highland Showcase in partnership with the Royal Bank of Scotland, with a formal award ceremony planned for the 2022 Royal Highland Show.

Gold awards are presented to previous Silver award winners for continuous outstanding merit.

**KUBOTA UK -** Earning another Silver this year is Kubota UK for their M7003 Premium KVT tractor and the BV Series TIM round baler. Kubota's TIM (Tractor Implement Management) is a cross-product and crossmanufacturer ISOBUS solution for the agricultural machinery industry, whereby the implement is able to control certain tractor functions. The TIM system enables the implement to automatically control certain functions of the tractor to optimise the quality and efficiency of the overall system. Kubota is the first manufacturer to receive the renowned AEF certification for a tractor/implement combination. The TIM system offers decisive advantages, such as reduced driver fatigue, at the same time increasing comfort and efficiency.



**CALIBRATE INC LTD - Calibrate Inc Ltd** earned Gold for their Heatpump Heat/Chill 6MW System. The Heatpump Grain Drying System means users can enjoy a 'Hands Off' Heatpump solution. The 6mW heat pump system manages a revolutionary Grain Drying process. A bespoke controller can operate the grain dryer via a cloud-based system enabling Calibrate to monitor all aspects of the process and tariff generation meters online.



**GRAINTEK UK LTD - Graintek UK Ltd were** awarded Silver for their Baby Portable Grain Dryer. Designed to be the smallest portable grain dryer that can dry by using continuous or batch mode with the flick of a switch, uniquely it can run from a 16a single phase supply using plc and inverter technology. The design uses a single leg elevator running in continuous mode to fill and dry at the same time, cutting the cost of power and equipment required. It is a 50% full scale size of its 9 tph bigger brother.



#### TECHNICAL INNOVATION AWARDS

**MASSEY FERGUSON** - Massey Ferguson also impressed the judges, winning Silver for their MF 8S Tractor. Built from a blank canvas using a 'Voice of the Customer' study, this was used to create something completely new. Key feedback underlined the need for comfort, ease of use, value for money, excellent reliability, intuitive and convenient controls, efficiency transmitting maximum power to the ground, 100% connectivity and the ability to work with the most demanding implements. The Dyna E-Power, is the ultimate dual clutch technology, stepless shifting raising comfort, maximum power to the ground due to the mechanical conception and the best fuel efficiency in its class.



#### SAFE FORESTRY BY SAFE WORKSITE


- Safe Forestry by Safe Worksite also earned a Silver this year for their **Safe Forestry App**, an app supported by a desktop system designed to show competence and compliance whilst at work in the forestry industry. The app focusses on Health and Safety, ensuring that all risk assessments and documentation such as training and maintenance of equipment is in one place and up to date. The app is based on industry best practice and customisable to the tasks undertaken. There are plans to roll this out to the agricultural industry next.



**SMALL ROBOT COMPANY - Presented** with a Silver award this year also was Small Robot Company for their End to End per Plant Farming. This ground-breaking multi-robot's end-to-capabilities were demonstrated to deliver per plant weeding, which is a world first. 'End-to-end' means that one robot ('Tom') scans fields for weeds, which are processed and detected by Wilma, an artificial intelligence Advice Engine, devising a weed treatment plan. Then a second robot ('Dick') is activated to go to the very same spot, ID the weed, and kill it. This new model gives Per Plant precision. Each plant can be farmed individually, with minimal waste. Benefits include cutting chemicals and emissions by up to 95%, delivery of Net Zero targets, and increasing

yields by up to 20 tonnes per hectare for wheat, from the current UK average of 8.5.

**5|AGRI** - Earning a Commendation is 5|Agri for their **Agri Ignite**, a farm business software for farmers and agricultural consultants. The cloud-based software programme enables farmers and their consultants to make decisions based on real time data. The system is fully integrated with Xero accounting software, undertakes livestock movements for BCMS and ScotEID and records medicine compliance. Agri-Ignite was amended to provide an online IACS portal. Farmers can log in and view maps of their crops, confirm their livestock numbers, agree deductions and the various schemes that they are participating in.



#### TECHNICAL INNOVATION AWARDS

MCHALE - Also awarded a Commendation was McHale for their **Orbital Bale Wrapper**. It is unique in that it encompasses the proven Vertical Wrapping ring carried over from the very successful McHale Fusion but transforms it into a high speed and high end trailed wrapping machine. With the ability to pick up one bale whilst wrapping another and carry on down the field to the next bale, it offers a very fast and efficient method of bale wrapping. The rear wrapper roller automatically adjusts to meet the bale size implemented through the control box meaning that the band of film is always placed on the centre of the bale, regardless of bale size.



**SPREAD-A-BALE -** Spread-a-Bale were also presented with a Commendation for their Spread-a-Bale balers, the HD and **XL**. The HD works for hard, high density round and rectangular bales and the XL for two round bales or extra long rectangular bales. Each provides real straw spreading solutions to issues emerging from the latest trend towards more ergonomically efficient high density baling machines and longer rectangular bales. Overall, the options contribute to Spread-a-Bale enabling farmers to make further reductions in spreading time and labour, and straw savings of between 30% to 50%.



**SMARTRURAL** - Another Commendation was earned by SmartRural for the Smart Rural **App**. Their work to date has clearly shown that there is considerable value derived from the use of readily available sensors across different farm types, to generate data that helps the farmer work smarter; make their businesses more profitable & sustainable; and aid them on the road to net zero.

**UBCO BIKES UK LTD - Finally, UBCO** Bikes UK Ltd also received a Commendation for their **UBCO 2x2**. The UBCO Adventure 2X2 is the world's first Electrically Powered 2wd Utility Bike built specifically with agricultural users in mind. Its unique design comprises of encased motors within both wheels powered by 3.1kW battery. It has no chain or belt to be damaged in our working environments and is a low maintenance machine. Designed and engineered in New Zealand, the machine was initially made to offer a safe, sustainable alternative to farm transport replacing more dangerous options powered by internal combustion engines.



#### **RHASS Chief Steward of Technical Innovation. Christo Shepherd said:**

"I would like to extend my congratulations to the winning entries of the Technical Innovation Awards this year. This year's entries were exciting examples of the innovative work going on within the agri-tech industry, and especially inspiring were the number of software solutions entered this year.

### CASE STUDY – SAFE FORESTRY BY SAFE WORKSITE

Safe Forestry by Safe Worksite earned a Silver this year for their Safe Forestry App, an app supported by a desktop system designed to show competence and compliance whilst at work in the forestry industry.

We spoke to Calum Duffy, Director of Safe Forestry, to find out how their app is changing the industry for the better and what it means to win a Silver award.

### Tell us more about your company

Safe Forestry aims to make the forestry industry safer for those who work there. This also includes being able to prove professional competence and continuous professional development of those operating in the forests and those who manage them.

## What led you to develop your entry and how is it helping the industry?

We were challenged by the Health and Safety Executive during a site visit in February 2019 to improve the way we prove the competence of our operators.

Like most other contractors at this point, we were relying on certification and word of mouth for an operators' skill level. The HSE visit soon pointed out that wasn't enough if it were to "all go wrong... So this is where the concept of Safe Forestry was born.

After 2 years of field testing by our operators and several other contractors the system now incorporates the fundamentals required to work towards compliance.

Safe Forestry offers managers, contractors and operators an operator friendly way of recording their competence,

ongoing CPD, machinery checks and any other site activities that will prove the professionalism of the individuals involved. This is all backed up by photographic evidence and logbook entries. An app on the operator's phone is all that is needed.

### How does it feel to win a RHASS Technical Innovation Award?

We at Safe Forestry by Safe Worksite are honoured to have been awarded a Silver Technical Innovation Award by the Royal Highland and Agricultural Society of Scotland for our health and safety app. This award recognises the innovative approach we have taken to support competence and compliance within the forestry industry.

This award means a lot to us. It is validation that what we are doing is innovative and keeping people safer at work.

## How do you think winning will make a difference to your business?

This will increase awareness of our product within the forestry sector in Scotland.

## How did you find the process of applying for the Technical Innovation Awards?

Straight forward and easy to do.

### What are the plans for the future of the business?




### Why do you think innovation is important for the industry?
